## Overwintering Harvesters


Ronda Spink, the Michigan Butterfly Network Coordinator, attempted to overwinter Harvester pupas. I was curious to hear the end result of her project and share the news with you. This has also been a great opportunity to see some up-close, gorgeous photos of these special butterflies! Thank you, Ronda, for sharing this with "The Lonely Satyr" community. Cheers, Leslie

### Ronda's notes from August 2023:

"Since I have seen so many Harvesters this year, I decided to try to find a caterpillar. Sarett Nature Center (Benton Harbor, MI) is one of the places that I have seen three of the 16 adults so far this year. Sarett has great habitat for Harvesters with the Black Alder and aphids that the butterfly and caterpillar need. Most of the time the aphids are hard to reach but I found a group low to the ground right near a dock where I could sit and access them. I am usually prepared with a toothpick to 'comb' carefully through the aphids to look for both the eggs and the caterpillars. The only thing I had in my fanny pack was a broken dental pick that I had forgotten to throw away (thank goodness) and the pointed part of it worked perfectly."



Harvester caterpillars - To avoid ants, they will live hidden amongst silk webs and aphid carcasses.




Harvester Pupa

## Overwintering continued

Ronda shared in an email this spring that the pupas overwintered successfully in a garage. Two emerged at the end of April. Ronda, along with grandsons Talus and Calvin, and daughter-in-law Suzee, took them back to their original spot to be released. The photos you see below are of the release moment for the first two. Those are nice, cheerful smiles. Great work, guys! The rest emerged during May, a few at a time.







Ronda's Harvester Fun Facts:

"Adults have very short proboscis and sip honeydew from the aphids. The four larval stages can complete growth in as little as 8 days. Pupa take only 8-11 days until emergence. The life cycle is only 3 weeks. Adults sip aphid honeydew, sap, carrion, mud, and dung, but not flower nectar."


